**A LAW TO AMEND THE CRIMINAL CODE (CONTINUANCE
OF PROVISIONS) LAWS, 1949.**

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor and
Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Cyprus as
follows :—

1. This Law may be cited as the Criminal Code Short title.
(Continuance of Provisions) Amendment (No. 2) Law, 1949,
and shall be read as one with the Criminal Code
(Continuance of Provisions) Laws, 1949, (hereinafter referred 12 of 1949
to as "the principal Law"), and the principal Law and 17 of 1949
this Law may together be cited as the Criminal Code
(Continuance of Provisions) Laws, 1949.

Substitution of section 60 of the Cyprus Criminal Code, 1928 to 1948, by new section.

2. For section 60 of the Cyprus Criminal Code, 1928 to 1948, which continues to have the force of Law by virtue of section 3 of the principal Law as though its provisions were set out in full in the principal Law, there shall be substituted the following section:—

“Possession of documents having a seditious intention and publication, etc., of propaganda of unlawful association.

60. Any person who—

(a) transmits through the post or who, without lawful authority or excuse, the proof of which lies upon him, has in his possession any book, periodical, pamphlet, poster, proclamation, newspaper, letter or any other document or writing whatsoever having a seditious intention as defined in section 50 of this Code; or

(b) prints, publishes, sells or exposes for sale, or transmits through the post or who, without lawful authority or excuse, the proof of which lies upon him, has in his possession any book, periodical, pamphlet, poster, proclamation, newspaper, letter or any other document or writing whatsoever which advocates or encourages any of the acts declared to be unlawful in section 61 of this Code or which is issued or appears to be issued by or on behalf of, or in the interests of, an unlawful association,

is guilty of a misdemeanour and any book, periodical, pamphlet, poster, proclamation, newspaper, letter or any other document or writing in respect of which such person shall have been convicted shall be forfeited.”
